RESEARCH BRIEF REDUCING HIGH SCHOOL DROPOUT THROUGH ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

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It is widely recognized that to close the achievement gap, schools must address the out-of-school barriers that impact academic success, especially those related to poverty. Recent research, newly updated here, shows that addressing these factors in a systemic way in elementary schools leads to bene ts much later in reducing school drop-out.

Childhood poverty is manifested in food insecurity, housing instability, contagions in the environment, inadequate medical care and insurance, lack of access to enriching activities, and stress on families, among many other conditions. These manifestations of poverty, each one important, interact and exacerbate one another. They demand a exible and customized approach to supporting the students who face them.
